We would like you to write a short story. You might like to do this once in the week or more than once (even a different story everyday). You will need to try and incorporate all your different writing skills you have perfected over the course of year 5. This is your chance to show off!</p> <p>You will need the mixed-up story sheet (on teams) and a 1-6 dice.</p>

- Use the resources saved on the Teams to learn about dashes. There is a powerpoint and some activity sheets to work through. Sometimes there might be more than one level activity, choose the level you wish to work at just like we do in school – you do not need to complete all the levels.

Roll the dice to choose your characters, setting and problem. It would be a good idea to make a quick little plan (you can choose the format of your plan). Remember these are short stories so it shouldn't take you hours to write and be pages and pages long.
You might like to collect your stories together and create a book of mixed up stories.

Learning Project - to be done throughout the week answering this week's question – What have you done to make you feel proud?

This week we are focusing on looking back at our time together in year 5. It has been an unusual year with many challenges, but there is much to celebrate about our time together. Here are some activities you might like to have a go at. You could choose one or try to do one each day. Don't forget to share them with us.

- Starting a new school year is a time to say farewell to current teachers and classmates who are leaving and hello to new faces. It is important to cherish your favourite memories. Create a drawing or art piece of your special memory and frame it in a hand-made photo frame. You may choose to draw a favourite lesson, a funny moment with friends, a school trip, your favourite teacher or a job role you were proud of. Here are some ideas of frames you might like to try.

- Everyone is unique and special. Over the course of the last year, you will have achieved so much. Whether that's learning your times tables, swimming more confidently or having the confidence to put your hand up in class and offer an answer. Remember that an achievement is something that has been accomplished through great effort, skill, perseverance or courage. Mind map all of your achievements this year, both in school and outside of school. Look at the mind map with an adult and decide on your greatest achievement? Why not have a go at writing about this special achievement. How did you accomplish this? What barriers did you face? Who helped you? You could record this as a story featuring yourselves as the main character, a newspaper report or even write a rap!
- Ending the school year can be a time that is full of mixed emotions for many of you. However, whilst many aspects of school life change, many remain the same too. Spend some time discussing all of the similarities and differences between your year 5 class and the year 6 class you are going into. You could record the similarities and differences using the table or chart. A new year is also a great time to make new friends. Can you create a poster that illustrates top tips for making friends and showing kindness? You could speak to family members or your own friends to gather some ideas first
- Art can be a great tool for self-exploration and self-expression. Create a piece of artwork which represents your personality and highlights your individual qualities. At the bottom of this page there is an example you might like to use as inspiration but you are welcome to use your own ideas. This could be a picture or something more abstract using materials available at home. You might find listening to your favourite music helps you be creative. Once completed, discuss your artwork with someone at home or with a friend using a video chat. What did you want to represent in this piece? How did you try to show off your personality through your artwork?
